Intermediate Macroeconomic Theory

Overview

This course is designed to provide students with the tools of macroeconomics to study various macroeconomic policy problems in-depth. The rst part of this course deals with theories of economic growth in the long run. We will study the production model, the Solow growth model and the Romer model. In addition to the growth models, in ation in the long run will be covered. The second part focuses on the two theoretical frameworks that are used to understand and explain economic uctuations in the short run: the IS-MP framework and AD-AS framework. Finally, in the last part of the course, we will utilize the short-run frameworks to analyze the Great Recession and then extend them to incorporate international nance. In the end you will have the technical tools and knowledge necessary to intelligently read about and discuss current and past macroeconomic events.

Prerequisites

ECON 2020 and ECON 1088 or MATH 1081 or MATH 1300 or MATH 1310 or APPM 1350 (all min grade C-)

This course requires a working knowledge of calculus. There will be no formal review of calculus techniques. Students who do not meet the requirement may be administratively dropped from this course.
