### Course Description

This course in environmental economics will introduce students to the relationship between the economic system and environmental systems. Whereas natural resource economics focuses on flows from the environment to the economic system, environmental economics focuses on flows from the economic system to the environment. One classic example of these flows would be air pollution. This class builds upon basic microeconomic thought to analyze environmental impacts. Students will learn the tools to consider market failures and the important question of whether or not market interventions are justified on economic grounds. This course will also address institutions and policy issues related to climate change, ecosystem services, and renewable energy.

 $\underline{\text{Final:}}$  The final exam will take place on Wednesday May  $5^{\text{th}}$  proctored online. The final exam is mandatory.

#### Midterms:

### Participation Quizzes:

Research has shown that students who regularly attend courses perform better on exams. While we are in an online learning environment, I have continued to see higher grades from more engaged students. Therefore, I am strongly encouraging regular attendance and participation through zoom quizzes that will be given each lecture. These quizzes will account for 15% of your final grade.

To remain in the course, you must be present for 2 out of the first 3 days of class. Otherwise, you risk being administratively dropped to make room for students on the waiting list. If you are not able to make this attendance for some reason, contact me as soon as possible.

### Homework Assignments:

There will generally be weekly homework assignments what will make up 20% of your grade. These homework assignments will be assigned through canvas and due by Sunday at 11:59 PM. There fill be no homework due the first Sunday of class (Jan 17th). These homework assignments will be a mix of mathematical problems, answering conceptual questions, and occasional discussion questions.
